


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Sticky Faith Service Guide: Moving Students From Mission Trips To Missional Living

Great guide for helping with missions trips. Youth pastors and leaders are busy people; and this is a great tool to use when going on a missions trip. Everything pre, during, post, and future help for the mission trip. You have enough to worry about in the small details of the trip, let this book come along side and be a great resource to help prepare and mature your students fully experience missions and service!

Mission trips usually have two important, simultaneous outcomes. First, those to whom the missionaries minister are blessed and they get encouragement, which sometimes leads into a lifetime of ministry. Second, and probably more reliably, the missionaries themselves go through a transformation through the act of service and ministry (well, if they go for the right reasons), resulting in more spiritual maturity for the missionaries. This book covers both to a point but is heavily lopsided towards the latter. While this is the general idea with this guide, it's a little too unbalanced. This is a mission leader's guide. The guide is broken down into five major sections which I will paraphrase as follows: 1. The call to go on a mission, 2. Preparing for the trip, 3. The experience and service of the trip, 4. Immediately after the trip ends, and 5. Continuing the journey. Each of these sections is very well written and includes excellent information, solid preparatory advice for preparing missionaries for the field service, study topics and more. From this perspective, it seems to be decent and has a lot of good ideas and material. However, it over-emphasizes the expected changes in the missionaries to the point that it feels like this is the sole objective in places. Perhaps these changes are the intended purpose, but it crowds out the point of reaching others and bringing them into relationship with God. Sure, it's there, but it seems very secondary and almost an afterthought. Doesn't seem like much salt to me. I struggle with this book. It does have some excellent study helps and is a good preparatory guide for missionary training and building, but it does so by grossly under-emphasizing the need to reach others. A mission trip where there is little attention to reaching the lost is not a mission trip, it's a church retreat.

Being a parent of three teenagers and having been a volunteer in our student ministries at church for five years, I can tell you that one of the greatest challenges with mission trips and service projects is having more than just a momentary impact. StickyFaith Service Guide takes the adult leaders/pastors step-by-step through the process of creating a meaningful service project/trip that will impact teens for years to come. The five parts of this book cover:1. The initial steps of getting started, how to partner with parents and the church-at-large, crafting a service trip that sticks2. Exercises and devotions that prepare adults the students for their upcoming trip/project. This part includes an emphasis on prayer and a section on becoming aware of where God's story intersects with yours.3. Exercises to complete while you're on trip/project.. These daily quiet times help students reflect on their day, prayers, impact they are having, and how they see God working.4. Debriefing exercises that you complete with the final hours of your trip.5. After trip sessions that focusing on ongoing transformation. There is so much that I like about this book I really don't know where to begin. It is laid out in a realistic manner that is very doable, but not watered down. I love the emphasis on family and community. I can really see this book having an impact on both adult leaders and students.

As a trainer and leadership/management coach with three college degrees in how people learn, I am impressed with this book, and its companion Journal book ---A Sticky Faith Service Guide, Student Journal: How Serving Others Changes YouSo many activities in both business and the church are just, "get 'er done." Very little THOUGHT is given to projects beyond how to make them happen. These books establish an *excellent* framework for learning:1. The "pre-event" planning, which goes past the "what" and deep into the "why."2. Methods for observing and giving thought to the events as they're happening.3. "Post-event" debrief activities, to help build and/or strengthen the core lessons in one's mind and heart.Naturally, the book can only be used "so many times" - but hopefully one recognizes the patterns to the point that they could be modified / replicated to meet people where they're at in their spiritual growth. One additional point I'd like to make: These books are not just for missions trips! My daughter is in American Heritage Girls (a very Christian form of scouting for girls), and they are required to do "service projects" throughout the year. I've seen some of these projects get planned and executed, but sometimes they happen with that "just get 'er done" mentality. These books are written/designed in such a way that they help cement solid, valuable lessons in the girls' service projects, too!If you have anything to do with service projects / missions trips, these books WILL be helpful!!

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
