

Socks, Scarves and Baby booties and Layettes are about the only thinks I use knitting for. Except for the occasional toy, doll clothes or blouse, I personally prefer crocheting. I do know others that will do knitting before even looking at a crochet hook. The choice is yours, but both are great talents to know. There are so many things to create, afghans, clothing and household items. So many things to tempt you. Learn the basics that are easy to read and replicate. My rating of "How to Knit Learn the Basic Stitches and Techniques. A Storey Basics® Title" is 4.75 out of 5 stars.

Knitting is a fun and productive hobby, but it can be quite daunting to someone who has never tried it before. What kinds of needles and yarn should I use? How do I cast on? What are the basic stitches, and how can I tell if I'm doing it right? How do I fix a mistake? Leslie Ann Bestor has been knitting for many, many years, and she definitely knows her stuff; with Storey's new beginner guide "How to Knit," Bestor applies her experience and expertise to helping the newbie knitter find their footing. This cute little book, small enough to be easily tucked into your knitting bag, is not a complete guide by any stretch, but it does cover everything you need for understanding the basics of knitting. All of the above questions and more are answered,

while Bestor's conversational tone makes the information accessible; reading this book feels like talking with an old friend who just happens to know a lot more about knitting than you do. Topics are clearly explained with step-by-step instructions and effective illustrations. This is a fantastic beginner guide. Review originally written for San Francisco Book Review.

I really am the target audience for this book: I have no knitting experience whatsoever but have always wanted to learn. This book is friendly, has quite a few illustrations, tips and tricks, and how to correct mistakes. As well, understanding different types and sizes of needles, yarns, and reading patterns are discussed in depth. It's a great starting point for beginning knitting. The book is broken down as follows: Chapter 1: when you're ready to cast on. Chapter 2: The basic stitches: knit, purl, and slip. Chapter 3, Shaping up your knitting with increases and decreases. Chapter 4: We all make mistakes. Chapter 5: Getting down to the tools and materials. Chapter 6: Learning to decipher patterns. And appendices which include: knitting abbreviations, knitting needle size conversion chart, craft yarn council table of yarn weights and yarn label symbols. Then resources and an index. Within each chapter, information is broken down into helpful subsections, everything from changing to a new ball of yarn to What the heck is gauge? I have several books from Storey Basics and they are all very good. Illustrated rather than with pictures so the learning is clean and easy (photographs can be really problematic sometimes due to lighting issues or angles). The tone is always friendly and encouraging - it's like having a master sitting next to you teaching you what you need to know. I used this book to buy my first needles and with my 11 year old, together we knit our first few rows. It was pretty exciting for both of us and I want to thank the author for writing such a user-friendly tutorial and guide. With a bit more practice, we're going to try a simple scarf! I got the ebook ARC of this title for free from NetGalley to read and review, regardless this is my 100% honest opinion. This book would be good for knitting beginners. It's laid out a bit differently than other books I have read on learning to knit or crochet because it has how to make various stitches first, then it goes into tools and materials including yarn types and ending in some beginner patterns to make. Most of the books I have read start with the tools and materials first then get into stitches. Patterns are then either at the back or mixed into learning various stitches in the learn as you go method (which is my favorite and what this book lacks). The other reason I would mark it down stars is because it is a very visually simple book and some people may like that but I like a lot more pictures on how make the stitches as well as real pictures to see how the product should look as you go. For some reason the books with real pictures are easier for me to read from rather than

books with line drawings or diagrams such as this one. I will continue using it to learn how to knit because I now have the ebook, but it's not one that I would purchase for myself.

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
