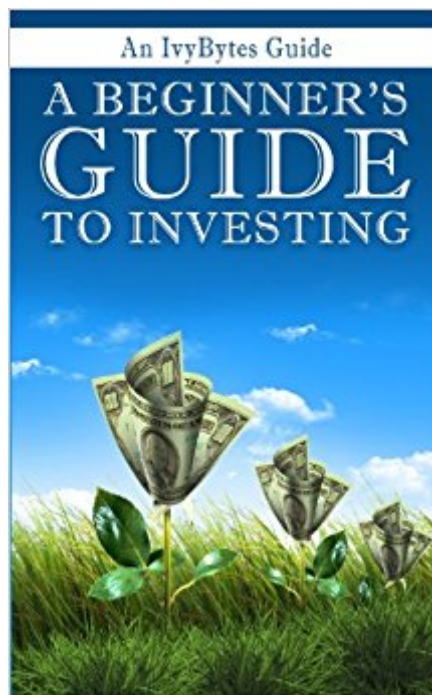

I've read four investing books so far because I'm a beginning investor. I wished I had read this book first because the other ones were so dense, and starting with this book would have given me a better context of investing. "Less is more" is the author's writing style - clear and simple. It assumes that if you're a beginning investor, you'll do further research as you become more competent. Two things I learned from this book that I didn't learn from the other four: 1. The actual number I need to save each year to meet my retirement goal. The formula is clear and immediately applicable. 2. How to create a truly diversified portfolio by investing in different types of assets. He taught me how much to purchase of each asset class and even suggested ETFs by their name. What a deal for a \$1. Also, I emailed Alex, the author, and he wrote back with an answer. WOW! That never happened before.

This book is a perfect example of how owning a couple keywords on kindle, such as "beginners guide to investing" can make an author a ton of money. However, I don't think it is the best book on the subject by a long shot. Pros: -I like the sandbox vs. lockbox analogy, and think it is a good approach for someone to wade into trading stocks. -Aggregates some good information available

elsewhere online-Good basic info with links to other resourcesCons:-This book needs an update. Robin Hood didn't exist when it was written, and the author recommends brokerages that still charge 7-10 bucks per trade- which is 14-20 round trip, like Etrade. Stock brokers, like casinos, make huge profits by nibbling away at small traders' cash. Small traders have no business paying commissions and will lose money if their cost structure is too high.-Instead of linking to other resources, he should have just explained them and written a longer book. 100 pages is fine, but it's even shorter than it looks, and 100 page paperbacks don't have the same quality of binding.-There's solid advice in here, but nothing really you couldn't google.I could probably get behind this book a lot more if they did another edition for 2017, but online trading has changed a lot in the last 5 years.Recommendations:Trading- How to Day Trade for a Living- Andrew Aziz, Picking Winners- Andy Beyer, or anything by Jim Cramer (his books are better than his show),Investing- The Intelligent Investor- Benjamin Graham, High Finance- Logan Kane, Dividend Playbook-Josh PetersBusiness/Success- Have to go with The Millionaire Fastlane by MJ Demarco, such a good book.

It is stated in the title that it's meant to grow wealth the "smart and easy way" and that's exactly the information it gives you. It didn't say quickly, it didn't say grow a fortune overnight, it said easy and that's exactly what it does. It explains long term, safe practices and financial saving advice. Nothing more, nothing less. Overall i have to say it was a nice paced read and is for beginners so it delivers exactly as expected.

Very clear and concise info. This book should be handed out to every kid as they walk out of college and/or high school - or even before. Everyone needs at least a minimal understanding of personal finance and investing - although most people don't have it or get it way too late and regret that they didn't figure it out sooner. This book takes care of the investing part of that need. At best, it will get you motivated to dig deeper and take serious control of your retirement investing, but even if it doesn't, it at least gives you the ability to confidently create more of a set-it-and-forget-it strategy that will take minimal effort on your part and will help you reach your future financial goals.

Very nice book for a young person who wanted to become more confident in understanding investments. The chapters were organized in a logical format and was very concise yet detailed. The examples and figures provided really are eye-opening in terms of how much money someone

can be leaving on the table (in terms of starting to invest too late in life or making poor investment choices). Very good tips as well in terms of the importance of diversification and how to start and plan out a proper investment portfolio. This was the first investment book I read and had no trouble with completing it in a few hours of reading. Very valuable information for under \$10! Really gave me appreciation for the advice from my parents to start saving as early as possible!

Clearly a beginner's guide, but does great at that. For those who barely understand what compound interest is, this is the book you're looking for. For people who do, this book describes a good starting point to start saving and investing for the future (i.e., retirement). It's easy to digest, even though sometimes they do waddle into the deeper parts of economics (though not for long, and it's always good stuff to learn). It'd make a perfect gift for a high schooler, college student, or young professional who'd be even mildly interested in saving or investing (investing sounds more fun to me than saving, at least).
