

The Things They Cannot Say: Stories Soldiers Won't Tell You About What They've Seen, Done Or Failed To Do In War



Synopsis

What is it like to kill? What is it like to be under fire? How do you know what's right? What can you never forget? In *The Things They Cannot Say*, award-winning journalist and author Kevin Sites asks these difficult questions of eleven soldiers and marines, who "by sharing the truth about their wars" display a rare courage that transcends battlefield heroics. For each of these men, many of whom Sites first met while in Afghanistan and Iraq, the truth means something different. One struggles to recover from a head injury he believes has stolen his ability to love; another attempts to make amends for the killing of an innocent man; yet another finds respect for the enemy fighter who tried to kill him. Sites also shares the unsettling narrative of his own failures during war "including his complicity in a murder" and the redemptive powers of storytelling that saved him from a self-destructive downward spiral.

This collection of stories, as told by an embedded reporter, will stand the test of time as a first-hand look at the direct effects of the "war on Terror" upon Marines, soldiers, sailors and airmen. These stories do not sell out for the John Wayne version- they depict loss, suffering, grief, anger, boredom, etc. Sometimes, people take shots at the enemy- and miss. That's ok- not every story is made for Hollywood. This collection of stories is haunting to me, as someone who has also fought in these wars. It's not overly depressing but cold hard reality is faced-including what happens years later, after the war.

I have several friends at work who have served. Others that served, then went to the Reserves and served some more. Still others who kept getting called up and re-activated. I have seen sharp/witty well-adapted folks return to civilian life - and be "not quite the same" as before. My son has just taken the Marine Oath and will be a Reconnaissance Man (MOS 321). War has its tolls. Our young men and women who have been fighting these recent wars have been sent out longer, put on high-alert for extended periods, left on patrol (on a 360-degree hyper-alert swivel) with badness in all directions - then sent home. The stories in this book are real. You can hear the hurt and dismay in the author's words, even as he tries to stick to the facts and the raw observations provided to him. You can see the damage - to both the warfighters themselves, the families around them, and the relationships that could have been much different, given different circumstances. I pray for our soldiers who are in harm's way. I pray that they come back in one piece - physically, mentally, and spiritually. This book describes several heroes who did not come back "the same".
