

Synopsis

In a world with little hope and no rules, the only thing they have to lose is themselves. Rhys Cooper is a dead man. But with each passing day, it looks less and less likely that Rhys can be saved. I admit, I went into this with the idea this book was going to be poorly disguised porn. As another reviewer put it, the plot sounded completely implausible as a real story. Instead it was a very realistic look at the world that existed in that universe and was incredibly well written.I highly recommend this book.

It's post-apocalyptic Earth. "Oregon, actually. There was a terrible virus, which rampantly spread through the world's population and basically turned people into zombies, killing most, and dooming the rest. Not only that, but several forms of the virus are airborne (that's really bad news). As with quite a few post-apocalyptic survivors, Rhys Cooper has lived most of his life in a rural religious commune, and when zombies break into his family's compound, he gets exposed. Lucky for him, the regional task force full of super human soldiers finds him, and they have an idea for a cure for him—but Rhys isn't going to like it. I'm pretty sure the inspiration for this story started thusly: Wouldn't it be hot if there was this guy, and though he's reluctant at first, he agrees to have relations with a bunch of really hot dudes? Nonstop. For weeks. Because it will save his life because he has some kind of virus, or something. Yeah! and they have like antibodies in their reproductive secretions, that can only be received a certain way, because those tissues are super absorbent! Yes, brilliant! And it works. Wow. This story was hot.I couldn't very well label the genre M/M, now could I? And M/M/M didn't work either. Let's just say it's explicit, and involves lots of partners, but there is a single pairing in the romance portion of the story for Rhys. There's also a fair amount of BDSM, and as much as I enjoy BDSM in my stories, these aspects weren't really the main focus for me. They were more about flavoring the soldier's personalities and their rough lives, and how they deal with that stress. The world was gritty and intense. The soldiers in the task force take Rhys with them (so they can inoculate him), as they wander the Pacific Northwest, trying to rid the world of the zombie virus threat. But they are also infected, because the same virus that nearly wiped out the world, also mutated in them to make them faster and stronger. This means they can't really mingle with the common populace, so they live a rootless existence, checking the perimeters of

every town, cut off from the rest of humanity, and also trying to save them. It had Superman vibes. But with bondage. And lots of unprotected intercourse (with lube). All in all, I felt bad for Rhys. He had a pretty terrible childhood, being stuck in a religious commune that repressed him socially, and his family literally starved him out of rations as punishment for his *œsins*. And then his heroes ended up being these overly masculine social rejects, who have some pretty gnarly ideas on how to get off. And Rhys goes for it, because it's all he has. And he enjoys it because it's all he has. The reasons for his enjoyment are most definitely a psychologist's worst nightmare, and his desires to be needed and wanted in this capacity are certainly messed up. "it taints nearly everything in the story. But it works. Because not all stories (especially not post-apocalyptic ones) are happy. And even though I can't say that Rhys finds his happy ending, I think he finds a happy enough ending, and a place in this screwed up world, which is all most of us can say by the end of it.

This is the first book by Amelia C. Gormley that I've read. And now I'm adding her to my *œMust Read* list. This was an amazing book from start to finish, and one that I didn't want to end. Her characters were real, and while the book may feature an apocalyptic virus and zombie-like monstrosities, the real story is one of survival and healing from an emotionally abusive past. Rhys is a young man ready to sacrifice himself to save his loved ones when he comes across Darius and his company of *œJugs* out trying to save what's left of humanity. The catch is that in order to survive, Rhys has to allow Darius and anyone else in the company the right to sexually take him, any time, any place. There's a bit more to it than that, of course, but Amelia makes some great use of dubcon, domination and submission, and multiple partners. The sex is both emotional and hot, with just enough of both elements to make it work. I've read dubcon that just made me shudder, but the way it is handled here didn't give me any problems at all. In fact, I loved it. The relationship between Rhys and Darius is also suitably stormy, and there's a bad guy to watch out for as well. The book pulled me along from start to finish with virtually no lag. I would recommend this book for those who enjoy steamy M/M in any kind of a paranormal setting, including science fiction and thriller, or who like D/s and dubcon. This book dealt with much more than I expected. It is set in a post-apocalyptic world, so deals with a lot of death, destruction, and pain. But in that world, Rhys is a bright light of innocence and youth. He makes this book lighter, especially as he discovers the bonds between and beauty in the rough soldiers, the Jugs. I loved the premise, the world building, and the actual biological knowledge behind the different strains of the virus and their effects. The disparities between the different characters made their interactions interesting and unpredictable. Also, the story itself, including the ending, didn't happen as I expected, which is a very good thing. This is a book about making beauty and grabbing what happiness you can in a harsh environment. All the characters were complex and very natural to the story. I loved how Darius also changed, grew as a person along with his feelings for Rhys, allowing him to give to Rhys what he needed. Everything in this book was handled well and put together smoothly. From the forced couplings to save Rhys (mirroring the rough world and contrasting Rhys's idealized view of sex and love), to the nature of the virus, to the origin of the virus, to their survival, to the growth of the characters, and beyond. This is a quick and involved read, you won't want to put it down. I was very engrossed and pulling for each of the characters. Five full stars for this read, I recommend it fully.

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
